The era of neoliberal globalization is conventionally traced back to the market fundamentalism of the Reagan Revolution. This book argues against this conventional wisdom. Drawing on over 10,000 declassified internal documents from the U.S. and U.K. Treasuries, we show how market

ideologues in the U.S. government significantly hindered the project of exporting free markets around the world. Behind these misadventures were an innate resistance to compromising with wealthy industrialized allies, and an unwillingness to support international institutions especially the IMF and World Bank with the capacity to pry open developing economies. This book te 1980s, and

traces its origins to Paris and London--where more pragmatic policymakers promoted a more realistic vision for simultaneously addressing the Third World debt crisis and exporting market liberalization. And it illuminates the enduring handicaps the United States faces in the exercise of global economic leadership.
